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Company developing training simulation equipment for police and military personnel opens headquarters in Forsyth County

InVeris, a technology company that makes training simulation equipment for law enforcement and armed services, held a ribbon cutting ceremony Thursday, Sept. 17, for the company's new headquarters.

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and armed services, held a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Thursday, Sept. 17, for the company's recently opened facility off McFarland Road in south Forsyth.

"We do what really nobody else does, which is, we take the small weapons for military and law enforcement purposes, we redesign them, we retool them and turn them into simulators," Clyde Tuggle, the company's CEO, told Forsyth County News. "But the real key to it on the system that we design and the software that we write, it's all proprietary software."

The facility is located along the technology corridor on Ga. 400. Tuggle said that was among multiple reasons for coming to Forsyth County.

"It's very simple: quality of life, quality of capability and a friendly government environment," Tuggle said. "And we're in the right neighborhood when it comes to high tech with this high-tech corridor that has been developed here and the ease of transportation and proximity to Ga. 400.

"Quite frankly, we're getting good talent that wants to come to work here because they want to be part of this high-tech community."



InVeris is made up of three legacy companies with decades in the live-fire and virtual training industries: Caswell International, Meggitt Training Systems and Firearms Training Systems Inc., also known as FATS.

The group was founded by former U.S. Sen. Saxby Chambliss of Georgia, who serves as chairman of the board.

"The products that [the company] has been producing for almost 100 years now are top-of-the-line in the business, and I and a group of folks got together, we formed a little private equity group, and we bought this company about six years ago," Chambliss told FCN.

Along with the Forsyth County headquarters, the company also has a location for Caswell by InVeris in Duluth.

Tuggle said the Forsyth County facility will handle manufacturing, design and development for the simulations, technology and software.

During Thursday's ceremony, visitors were able to try out some of the products, including shooting simulators that have recoil and can run out of ammo, just like real weapons.

The company also demonstrated virtual reality and augmented reality systems used by clients for training.

"Our mission is to keep the men and women in uniform safe and out of harm's way and to give them the training and the tools, provide them with the expertise to do their job, but really, most importantly, to keep them safe," Tuggle said.

The company also has a global presence and Tuggle welcomed a group from Singapore during the event.

"We look at what we do in supporting our allies as part of this fabric of global security," Tuggle said.

Chambliss, who served in the U.S. House from 1995 to 2003 and then as a senator from 2003 until 2015, said he is no stranger to Forsyth County.

"I'm very pleased to be back here in Forsyth County," Chambliss told the crowd. "I used to get 60-plus percent of the vote. I used to come here regularly. We're very proud that InVeris is making the investment here in Forsyth County."
